Abstract/Background

Many genres of Western pop music have some beginnings in African American culture, specifically genres such as rap and R&B. K-pop (Korean popular music) is the second most popular genre of music in South Korea.

Although both genres have been around for a while, K-pop wasn't heavily known to the US until 2013 with the debut of Koren boy group BTS. Since then, the rise of K-pop has grown substantially in the US over the next 10 years – for both citizens and music artists.

Research Findings

Although this is a fusion that has yielded positive results for both Western audiences and South Korean audiences, the media tends to spotlight the negatives that have come from this collaboration. Social media has made trends such as Asain Baiting mainstream, but what's not as well known, for example, is how much African-American music artists have been a source of inspiration for many K-pop idols or how South Korean idols have to come to support African-American movements
